Summer Reading Directions

All students are expected to read **at least one book** this summer and complete a **critical review** of their selected book. Students may choose a book from the recommended book lists on SLIDE 12, or select a title recommended by their McLean teachers on SLIDES 13 – 45. They're also welcome to choose a book that isn't on the lists provided, as long as it is appropriate and engaging for their grade level and they haven't read it before.

As students read, they should notes on the key elements of the
book.

Students are required to write a 2–3 page Critical Review of the book.

Critical Review Outline:

Paragraph #1

An introductory paragraph (with the title and author of your text) that hooks the reader and introduces key people, places, and events.

Critical Review Outline:

Paragraph / Section 2

One paragraph or section that describes the book's protagonist (main character). You should include details, quotes, summaries, and explanations from the beginning, middle, and end of the book.



Paragraph / Section 3

N'N

One paragraph or section that describes the book's major conflict. You should include details, quotes, summaries, and explanations from the beginning, middle, and end of the book.

Critical Review Outline:

Paragraph / Section 4

One paragraph or section that connects the text to another literary text, historical context, or current event. You should include details, quotes, summaries, and explanations from the beginning, middle, and end of the book.



Critical Review Outline:

Paragraph / Section 5

One paragraph or section that concludes your Critical Review and connect the book to your life.






Title: Firekeeper's Daughter Author: Angeline Boulley



Synopsis:

Daunis Fontaine, an 18-year-old caught between her hometown and Ojibwe roots, puts college on hold after a family tragedy. When she witnesses a murder and becomes involved in an FBI drug investigation, she's forced to go undercover. As she uses her knowledge of science and traditional medicine to search for the truth, Daunis uncovers painful secrets and must decide how far she's willing to go to protect her community.



Synopsis:








Synopsis:

Title: The Grapes of Wrath Author: John Steinbeck






Synopsis:

Synopsis:



Title: Children of Blood and Bone Author: Tomi Adeyemi




Synopsis:

Now, with help from a rebel princess, Zélie has one chance to bring magic back and fight the monarchy. As she's hunted by a determined crown prince and faces danger at every turn, Zélie must learn to control her powers—and her heart—before it's too late.

Synopsis:






The Greek Myths Reimagine




Title: The Kite Runner Author: Khaled Hosseini

Title: The Shadow of the Wind Author: Carlos Ruiz




Synopsis:






Title: Fault Lines in the Constitution: The Framers, Their Fights and the Flaws That Affect Us




Synopsis:






Title: Stories of Your Life and Others Author: Ted Chiang
